2023 Political Geography Specialty Group Business Meeting Minutes

Meeting held on Friday, March 24, 2023, in Denver, CO (began at 11:45 MT)

I. Call to Order & President's Report (Kara Dempsey)

Preconference:

- Held on Wednesday, March 22, 2023, at University of Colorado Boulder.
- 64 attendees, 36 papers, a plenary on Ukraine, and 6 panelists for the Morrill panel
- Thank you to the local host, John O'Loughlin, and Meredith DeBoom for their hard work, and to the Institute of Behavioral Science (IBS) for hosting us.
- Thank you also to all the volunteers who chaired a session and/or helped throughout the day with registration, technology, and logistics.

AAG Updates (from Chairs' Meeting):

- Main AAG conference had 6,000 attendees (80% in person) and 1,300 sessions.
- The previous AAG-owned headquarters building needed extensive remodeling to be up to code. The AAG sold that building and is now leasing a building in DC.
- The JEDI committee provided recommendations to the AAG Governing Board, which will be implemented soon.
 - Shannon O'Lear, University of Kansas, provided a brief update to PGSG business meeting attendees from her JEDI work.
- The Governing Board discussed the 2024 Hawai'i meeting, to be held April 16-20, 2024, in Honolulu. In response to concerns, the AAG's Executive Director, Gary Langham met with indigenous scholars in Honolulu. After discussions, these scholars were supportive of the AAG meeting in Hawaii provided that the AAG adopt three key policies, to which the AAG leadership agreed. The policies are: 1) hire a local indigenous coordinator, 2) elevate indigenous voices during the meeting, and 3) provide free attendance and vender space for indigenous individuals. AAG leadership has committed to implementing similar policies in all future locations, including the 2025 meeting in Detroit.

3. Budget Update (Meredith DeBoom)

PGSG is decisively (but not yet aggressively) spending down its higher-than-normal balance, which resulted from reduced spending over the past three virtual years. It will be important to monitor inflow/outflow moving forward, particularly once the 'cushion' is spent down and if revenue from dues continues to decline due to declining membership (a broader AAG phenomenon, not specific to PGSG). The PGSG is seeking to maintain a modest cushion to accommodate future student award and preconference costs (free preconference rooms are increasingly rare). This cushion will help the PGSG avoid having to decide between student awards and a preconference in a future year should costs increase or dues decline unexpectedly.

Donations are welcome and encouraged, particularly given the increased cost of travel to the 2024 AAG meeting in Honolulu. PGSG is happy to allocate donations specifically to graduate travel grant funding or other purposes. 5. General Discussion

Proposals

- Undergraduate Paper Award→Undergraduate Research Award: Sarah Salazar Hughes, a member of the Undergraduate Student Paper Award Committee, revisited her prior year's suggestion to expand the eligibility for the undergraduate award from only papers to a broader range of submissions (e.g., podcasts, StoryMaps). This proposal was adopted with broad consent from members in attendance. The Undergraduate Award Committee will implement this change for the next award cycle (Honolulu, 2024)
- **Graduate Paper Award Length Change:** Chris Lizotte, Chair of the Graduate Student Paper, proposed increasing the acceptable length for graduate student paper award submissions from 15 pages to a length that better reflects subfield journals. This proposal was adopted with broad consent from members in attendance. The Graduate Paper Award Committee will implement this change for the next award cycle (Honolulu, 2024)
- **Political Geography Teaching Materials:** Kara Dempsey, outgoing President, suggested that PGSG develop a shared folder of political geography teaching materials (e.g., syllabi, assignments). Such materials would be particularly valuable to graduate students and those in new teaching positions. Members in attendance expressed support for this proposal while noting the importance of ensuring that its establishment and maintenance does not overburden those tasked with managing PGSG's website (particularly if that individual is a graduate student). Kara offered to pursue this idea in her new role as President Emeritus. If you have suggestions, please contact Kara.
- **Promoting/Supporting Award Winners:** Meredith, incoming President, is working with Kate, incoming VP, to identify opportunities to promote PGSG award winners through PGSG-sponsored events at the AAG annual meeting and/or facilitated opportunities (e.g., an annual lecture featuring the Young Scholar Award recipient,

opportunities for graduate student paper award winners to connect with subfield editors). The goal is to provide additional recognition of awardees' work beyond the business meeting. Participation by award winners would be optional. If you have suggestions, please contact Meredith.

• **Professional Development Opportunities (Beyond the Preconference):** Meredith and Kate are investigating options to provide professional development opportunities for those who may be unable to attend the 2024 Honolulu preconference and AAG meeting for any reason. Suggestions are welcome! If you have participated in a successful or unsuccessful event of this sort, such as a virtual paper workshop, please share your experience and suggestions with Meredith and Kate.

• Thank you to Kara Dempsey, outgoing President, and Afton Clarke-Sather, outgoing President Emeritus! They have led PGSG through a challenging stretch, including an in-person preconference that was cancelled (Denver 2020), PGSG's first virtual preconference (Seattle 2021), an in-person preconference that was subsequently moved online (New York 2022), and PGSG's first in-person preconference in three years (Denver 2023). Kara also initiated and led efforts to fund the Morrill Award so that recipients can share their outreach work at the annual preconference and to support a more diverse pool of applicants through the PGSG student travel award.
